

t is extremely useful to be able to misquote TS Eliot, when the end of our financial year marks the start of Covid19!

However, we shall focus on the good things done during the year in review, and concentrate on the amazing adaptations our staff had to do in the changed world of Covid. in our next annual report.

As we have been reporting annually, the challenge at Enlighten is to use our donor money most effectively by concentrating on the upgrading of teacher skills. This is done in close cooperation with the Western Cape Department of Education, and the detail of those processes can be found in the report.

The other major emphasis is to upgrade the cultural capital of the children in our community, and a useful tool to evaluate our effectiveness is to apply Maslow's hierarchy of basic human needs to this

Here our library with a membership of 5874 our music lessons, both individually and in groups, and our amazingly active and vibrant Art and Pottery sections cater for both social needs and build up the self-esteem of our children. Those of us who attended the end of year art exhibition, with accompanying floor shows of dance and poetry, will witness to the enthusiasm and confidence of the young learners.

And then, of course, we have the vast and vital IT programmes which involve young and old in our facilities – look out for them!

We must also pay tribute to the dedication of the staff, who effectively, efficiently and affordably run such a wide-ranging [and exhausting!] programme. The trustees cannot speak too highly about the inspiration provided by the leadership of Magriet Peter as Manager, and Rodney Nissen as Projects Manager. It is a joy to be part of their report back at board meetings, accompanied by the exemplary management of our finances done by Almero Oosthuizen and his team.



n the year ended February 2020, Enlighten Education Trust has seen further growth in demand for its services in the community. This has been reflected in the increase in the numbers of children and educators benefitting from its many programmes.

The project teams proved once again that the bar can be raised continually through collective dedication and hard work.

As an organisation, we updated our mission statement to reflect a sharper focus on the needs in the community and our response to those needs working in conjunction with our many partners supporting education in the Overstrand. Early Childhood Development is a core part of our operations and following a consultative process we introduced the ROADMAP 2024 that sets a target to assist 30 Early Childhood Development (ECD) centres annually in becoming quality centres.

Foundation Phase Enrichment Programme and Counselling

Foundation Phase Enrichment Programme

he Foundation Phase Enrichment Programme (FPEP) is aimed at supporting learners who are lacking basic school readiness skills required for Grades R & 1. The programme meets the needs of any learner in the foundation phase who needs support in reading, writing and maths. A variety of activities have been designed by an occupational therapist to meet some of the various educational needs of Foundation Phase learners.

The project is currently offered in three Schools in the Overberg with the full support of the principals and Foundation Phase staff.

Hawston Primary Grade R&1 **Mount Pleasant Primary** Grade R&1 **Gansbaai Primary** Grade R&1

During the year we worked with 159 learners on a "one on one" basis (63 in grade R and 96 in grade1) and 21 teachers in the above schools. In addition, at the beginning of 2020, using a red flag assessment system, we tested a total of 216 learners over the three schools. The information was then captured and collated. It was a time consuming exercise but we gleaned very useful information from the results that will help in making adaptations to the programme in the future.

There is a growing number of Xhosa and Somali learners attending Mount Pleasant and Hawston schools. Both these schools offer Afrikaans as first language. For this reason, at the beginning of 2019. Mount Pleasant added an English grade 1 class. Unfortunately most of the learners in this class do not speak English as their first language. There are many more such learners who need help with literacy in the English and Afrikaans classes at most of the schools in Overstrand.

Parent Workshops were presented, outside school hours at Mount Pleasant. The WCED remedial teacher and the grade 1 teachers contributed to the workshop presentations. Attendance was below the expected levels and further efforts will be required to increase the level of parent participation.

We continue to assist in whatever way we can and where issues arise that are beyond the scope of the programme. learners are referred to the WCED educational psychologist, speech therapist, dentist, social workers or optometrists, in an attempt to address the learners many problems.

uring the year counsellors supported learners, teachers and parents from six schools in our community. A major focus of this work has been to assist children coping with grief.

129 learners have been supported for emotional issues.

Road Map 2024 For Overstrand

Early Childhood Development (ECD) Centres

CD is in its infancy for the majority of children in South Africa. Notwithstanding the progress made in ECD and Grade R provision, many challenges remain in relation to infrastructure, learning programmes, principal/practitioner development, management and administrative capacity, nutrition and funding. Enlighten continues to support the Western Cape Department of Social Development to improve standards across facilities in the Overstrand. Based on a consultative process during the year, EET agreed a plan for the upgrading of 30 ECD sites per year over a period of 3 years. Year 4 will be allocated to an evaluation process. It is anticipated that substantial quality improvements can be brought about through Principal and Practitioner Training as well as bi-weekly support site visits. The plan is highly ambitious but with the support of the public authorities and its generous donors, Enlighten is confident that this initiative will lead to improved outcomes in the centres concerned.

The Early Childhood Development (ECD) team have continued to be the service provider for the Western Cape Department of Social Development assisting ECD Sites and Aftercare Facilities in the Overstrand to fulfil all the stringent requirements for registration and re-registration. The project operated between RooiEls and Stanford across a total of 76 facilities. Extensive networking was necessary with the Municipality and specifically its Town Planning and Fire Departments, the District Health Department and the ECD sites themselves.

34 Edu-care centres are registered with the Department of Social Development and 48 educare centres are still un-registered or in the process of becoming registered.

Mandjie (Basket) Project -Engaging with Parents

he Mandjie(Basket) Project has again had a very positive engagement with Grade R parents in Zwelihle and Hawston. 234 households are

presented with a Mandjie of good cost effective learning resources and a Workbook of activities. The parents attend bi-weekly evening workshops where they go through the activities with their child's teacher. A total of 16 workshops (two per term) were presented during 2019. Much fun and positive learning takes place as parents make shapes and letters with playdough, patterns with pegs and cross their midlines as they hop over a skipping rope. All this they will do with their child to support his/her learning as it takes place in the Grade R class. Research shows that parental engagement along these lines can have significant effect on the children's home learning environment and on the overall development of the child in early education.

E-Learning

Mobile Unit

ET's Mobile unit significantly expanded is reach through our strategy of including ECD centres into the Hawston Schools Project, including Sonstraaltjies, Blommeland and Kids at the Centre Early Childhood Development centres.

The team conducted weekly visits to the following educational institutions demonstrating the CAMI (educational software for children — Maths, CAMI Reader, Perceptual Skills and Science) technology and upgrading the skills of the teachers in its use in relation to teaching literacy and numeracy.

HAWSTON SCHOOLS Information Communication Technology (ICT) PROJECT

The Trust committed to assisting both of the Hawston schools – Hawston Primary and Hawston Secondary schools in terms of increasing the numbers of learners taking Mathematics and Science as subjects, the improvement of literacy and numeracy at both schools and to facilitate access to technology for all learners and teachers. A further aim was to develop School Management teams by completing the Change Management in ICT course. The result is that both schools now have a functional computer lab and hands on training has begun. EET's e-Learning facilitator Mabandla Qolo has played a key role in the entire process. The first round of training has been completed covering the following

modules: Introduction to Google Apps; Online Resources; Mobile Skills; Microsoft Platforms-OneNote; Social Media skills; Learning Management System- Moodle and Smart classrooms. The next step is to integrate these skills into the curriculum lessons. Meanwhile, Teacher Professional Development continues while teachers integrate Technology in the classroom.

E-LEARNING TEACHER PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT TRAINING

The eLearning support programmes were extremely busy during 2019/20 academic year. Our eLearning team trained 409 teachers from Hawston Primary, Hawston Secondary, Mount Pleasant Primary, Okkie Smuts, Gansbaai Primary, Masakhane Primary and

Qhayiya Secondary whilst continuing our daily support in schools. The programme also facilitated the process of helping Qhayiya Secondary school to set-up a functional library and eLearning centre.

The training has a blended approach which includes a contact session and online Google platform course work

Teacher training sessions also commenced at Qhayiya Secondary on 15 October 2019 despite all the technical problems in their computer lab.

Mathematics Frank Coetzer

The Enlighten Mathematics facilitator, Frank Coetzer, supported the Grade 10–12 learners in two schools in the Overstrand: Qhayiya Secondary and Gansbaai Academia. It has been observed that only a very small number of leaners are prepared to take Mathematics at Higher Grade through to Grade 12. This is a concern well known to educational policy–makers. While there are examples of local initiatives making some progress in this area, as for example through EET's work, research continues at a national level on getting a better





understanding of factors impacting on mathematics education. This included issues such as socio-economic status, inequality, human, cultural and educational capital and the interaction between them.

Science and Technology Ryk van Romburgh

his project continued to provide an essential service to 14 teachers in 10 schools in the Overstrand. Assistance has been given with classroom management, the expansion of subject knowledge and the provision, development and use of resources and equipment. Basic laboratory equipment and supplies have been provided to teachers in order for them to complete practical demonstrations.

Three workshops for new intermediate phase teachers. Grade 4-6, have been presented during the course of the year. Follow-up sessions were done with individual teachers with the focus on the requirements of the national Curriculum, including the assessment programme.

One session per school, with the focus on practical activities, was presented during the afternoons to assist and



develop teachers. From time to time learners were supported with practical activities, but the main focus of this project remains intensive teacher upskilling in order for them to guide learners to do their formal practical tasks with confidence and SUCCESS.

Robotics and Research Days

The Robotics and Coding club has been very successful throughout the year. 393 learners attended sessions during the year as the Enlighten E-Learning team introduced Robotics WeDO activities at the centre on Mondays and Fridays, and at Hawston Primary School on Wednesday afternoons.

Project goals include: technical primary engineering skills and life skills.

We introduced coding for our learners as a new activity through the use of programs such as Scratch 3.0, BBC Micro-bit and various other online platforms such as Code.org and Minecraft. We believe this program will make a huge impact on our learners' ability to think critically and enhance their level of creativity, confidence, communication, mathematics and writing. Robotics presents us with the opportunity where learners from different backgrounds learn to solve problems and grow collectively.



Telematics Programme

e received a fully equipped Telematics broadcast facility from University of Stellenbosch and learners from Hawston, Zwelihle and Mount Pleasant attended these scheduled lessons at our centre.





Music, Visual Arts and Crafts

Music

The HAM (Hermanus Academy of Music) as the music project of Enlighten Education Trust is known, represents an amalgamation into a single project of all aspects of tuition and training both for schools and individual learners. A total of 290 learners benefitted during the year — a number of highlights deserve special mention.

The HAM learners did very well during the 2019 Overberg Eisteddfod where they won medals in two categories: the Hermanus WALDORF Marimba won the medal for Primary Schools Marimba Bands and Cameron Pedro won the Medal for the best Primary school Junior Pianist. The year under review was designated as a year of "consolidation" where emphasis was placed on developing technique and repertoire.

The UNISA results were once again excellent with 6 Roll of Honour candidates, five practical and one theory. The Hennie Joubert Award was awarded to Jasmine Banson, for being among the top two can-

didates in South Africa. HAM had a great achievement during the year with its first WCED Grade 12 Subject Music pupil, Daeun Kim, achieving a percentage of 96% in her final exam.



We managed to do this with support of teacher Annah Matibeli from Qhayiya, and Vivienne Mitchley from Hermanus High.

The remaining learners from grade 8 - 10 continued to take art under the programme. We now have a strengthening visual arts thread from the young learners right through potentially to matric level.

Some of our learners entered the 2019 regional art competition in Caledon — 'Pictures of the Overberg' and we are proud to announce that this time 3 of them won medals! Two gold medals were won in the senior division — Iviwe Mrwebi for his piece 'Animal Guardian' and Faith Mafiyo for her work 'Fairy Queen'. Chanelle Manize won a Silver medal for her self-portrait. They received their medals at a ceremony at Benguela Cove Wine Estate. Iviwe Mrwebi went on to attend the prestigious gala event which was held at the Zeitz MOCAA at the V&A Waterfront with his mother and teacher Ashleigh.

Our High School Group exhibited their large 'My Story' body mapping artworks at Sumaridge wine estate in May 2019 in an Exhibition alongside Mandela's artworks (a personal collection of the owner). They were extremely proud and enjoyed their outing to Sumaridge to see their work.

Enlighten Visual Arts took part in the Hermanus Fyn Arts Exhibition in June 2019 for the first time. It was



open to the general public and much appreciated by the learners and their families who visited.

Teacher Training continued successfully at Enlighten. The termly workshops were full with 24 teachers from the Overberg coming for Visual Arts training with a focus on grades 4-9 according to CAPS requirements. In addition, workshops were carried out for teachers at Mount Pleasant Primary School and for the Foundation Phase Teachers in Caledon.

Once again, our end of year Visual Arts Exhibition 'A Celebration of Colour' in November was the highlight of the creative year. The festive evening of art, music, food and dance featured learners work from grades 2 to 11, including our gold and silver medal winners' works. It was very well attended by the parents, teachers, Enlighten Staff, sponsors and the community as a whole.

Various end of year educational outings were organised, for example, to the 'Potter's Gallery' in Kleinmond and art galleries in Hermanus. The High School Group went on an outing to the Zeitz MOCAA Museum and the Iziko Museum both in Cape Town. Such exposure aims to broaden the learners' perspectives and to increase their interest in creative works.

Enlighten Community Library; Toy Library & Afrikaans Literacy

This is one of Enlighten's flagship projects, the heartbeat of the Enlighten Centre. It enriches the lives of children from the neighbouring communities who stream here in the afternoons and in the school holidays to do their homework or immerse themselves in the magical world of books.

Our library is a safe, welcoming place where children indulge in the pleasures of reading and gain new knowledge. The Mobile library also reaches beyond the library walls and serves hundreds of children in the Early Childhood Development (ECD) centres and schools of the Overstrand.

Invaluable extensions of the Community Library are the Educational Toy library and mobile book library, which during the year visited 3 primary schools and 18 edu-care centres throughout the Overstrand on a scheduled weekly basis. Monthly, 1400 children in under-resourced centres received the benefit of a rotating selection of books and educational toys to assist them to develop their thinking, language, problem-solving, social, small and gross motor skills.

On the 28th of May the Toy Library celebrated World Play Day with an event that was held at Enlighten Hall with */- 300 children between the ages of 3-6 years participating from the community. This is a special day for Enlighten staff as, in addition to supervising, many shared in the fun with the children. Pre-schools from Zwelihle, Mt Pleasant and Hawston were well represented: Nomzamo Educare, Ethembeni, Woelwaters, Vroulike Vinkies, Blommeland, Kids Centre. Activities included Balancing Beam, Hoola Hoops, Chef/ Doctor/ Nurse /Police Educational Toys, Face Painting and a picnic ensuring that all the children had a day to remember.









Afrikaans Literacy

uring the past year we supported 76 Somali and Xhosa learners from Grade 1-6 at two primary schools to understand and read Afrikaans, which is the language of learning and teaching at these 3 schools. A thorough assessment of these learners was completed and the most critical cases were prioritized and divided into smaller groups, according to their level of ability.

The main objective of this intervention is for learners to master Afrikaans and to be able to return to their classrooms with confidence and pass their school year successfully. All these learners achieved the basic skills to speak and understand Afrikaans and were able to grasp the subject matter of the learning areas. It also helped them to integrate socially with the other learners in the school.

There is a strong indication that this programme will need to be expanded to meet the growing demand.

Overstrand Junior Town Council - 2019/2020

The Overstrand Junior Town Council Youth leadership project is managed by Enlighten Trust on behalf of the Overstrand Municipality. The Junior Town Councillors are elected annually by the 6 high schools in the Overstrand. The project has a three-pronged approach namely: in-service training, public appearances and media, and Community Service. A strong focus is on serving the needs of the most vulnerable members of society.

35 Councillors were inaugurated on 31st October 2019 at the municipal auditorium in Hermanus. Early in the new year they attended a weekend leadership camp. The aim of the camp is to equip them with life skills and knowledge that will be useful in-school and in their daily lives.

Four centralized meetings were held at the Enlighten Education Trust centre during the course of the year. At these meetings the young leaders were given opportunities to report on their community service projects which were identified at the leadership camp at the beginning of the year. These informal meetings also provided opportunities to share their experiences.

Some of the projects undertaken involved the makeover of an edu-care centre, assisting staff at the Hermanus Animal Welfare Society with caring of the animals, donations of books and clothing for impoverished households were collected, visits to the elderly and the sick, an environmental clean-up of the town and fundraising to assist a group of children in Caledon with disabilities.

iteracy is essential to developing a strong sense of well-being and citizenship. Reading aloud to children at an early age is the most effective way to help them expand their vocabulary and recognize written words. Children who have developed strong reading skills perform better in school and have a healthier self-image. They become life-long learners and sought-after employees. When children focus on literacy activities they enjoy, reading is seen as a treat, not a chore.

After the Enlighten Shine Chapter left Lukhanyo Primary school in Zwelihle, the chapter continued at the Hermanus Waldorf School in Sandbaai. Thirteen volunteers worked with 19 pupils either on a one-on-one or one-on-two basis. The learners were assessed in June and again in November.


